A reading from the Acts of the apostles

¹⁴ But Peter, standing with the eleven, raised his voice and addressed them,

³⁶ Therefore let the entire house of Israel know with certainty that God has made him both Lord and Messiah, this Jesus whom you crucified."

³⁷ Now when they heard this, they were cut to the heart and said to Peter and to the other apostles, "Brothers, what should we do?" ³⁸ Peter said to them, "Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ so that your sins may be forgiven; and you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit. ³⁹ For the promise is for you, for your children, and for all who are far away, everyone whom the Lord our God calls to him." ⁴⁰ And he testified with many other arguments and exhorted them, saying, "Save yourselves from this corrupt generation." ⁴¹ So those who welcomed his message were baptized, and that day about three thousand persons were added.

¹³ Therefore prepare your minds for action; discipline yourselves; set all your hope on the grace that Jesus Christ will bring you when he is revealed. ¹⁴ Like obedient children, do not be conformed to the desires that you formerly had in ignorance. ¹⁵ Instead, as he who called you is holy, be holy yourselves in all your conduct; ¹⁶ for it is written, "You shall be holy, for I am holy."

¹⁷ If you invoke as Father the one who judges all people impartially according to their deeds, live in reverent fear during the time of your exile. ¹⁸ You know that you were ransomed from the futile ways inherited from your ancestors, not with perishable things like silver or gold, ¹⁹ but with the precious blood of Christ, like that of a lamb without defect or blemish. ²⁰ He was destined before the foundation of the world, but was revealed at the end of the ages for your sake. ²¹ Through him you have come to trust in God, who raised him from the dead and gave him glory, so that your faith and hope are set on God.

²² Now that you have purified your souls by your obedience to the truth so that you have genuine mutual love, love one another deeply from the heart.²³ You have been born anew, not of perishable but of imperishable seed, through the living and enduring word of God.²⁴ For

¹³ Now on that same day two of them were going to a village called Emmaus, about seven miles from Jerusalem, ¹⁴ and talking with each other about all these things that had happened. ¹⁵ While they were talking and discussing, Jesus himself came near and went with them, ¹⁶ but their eyes were kept from recognizing him. ¹⁷ And he said to them, "What are you discussing with each other while you walk along?" They stood still, looking sad. ¹⁸ Then one of them, whose name was Cleopas, answered him, "Are you the only stranger in Jerusalem who does not know the things that have taken place there in these days?" ¹⁹ He asked them, "What things?" They replied, "The things about Jesus of Nazareth, who was a prophet mighty in deed and word before God and all the people, ²⁰ and how our chief priests and leaders handed him over to be condemned to death and crucified him. ²¹ But we had hoped that he was the one to redeem Israel. Yes, and besides all this, it is now the third day since these things took place. ²² Moreover, some women of our group astounded us. They were at the tomb early this morning, ²³ and when they did not find his body there, they came back and told us that they had indeed seen a vision of angels who said that he was alive. ²⁴ Some of those who were with us went to the tomb and found it just as the women had said; but they did not see him."²⁵ Then he said to them, "Oh, how foolish you are, and how slow of heart to believe all that the prophets have declared! ²⁶ Was it not necessary that the Messiah should suffer these things and then enter into his glory?" ²⁷ Then beginning with Moses and all the prophets, he interpreted to them the things about himself in all the scriptures.

²⁸ As they came near the village to which they were going, he walked ahead as if he were going on. ²⁹ But they urged him strongly, saying, "Stay with us, because it is almost evening and the day is now nearly over." So he went in to stay with them. ³⁰ When he was at the table with them, he took bread, blessed and broke it, and gave it to them. ³¹ Then their eyes were opened, and they recognized him; and he vanished from their sight. ³² They said to each other, "Were not our hearts burning within us while he was talking to us on the road, while he was opening the scriptures to us?" ³³ That same hour they got up and returned to Jerusalem; and they found the eleven and their companions gathered together. ³⁴ They were saying, "The Lord has risen indeed, and he has appeared to Simon!" ³⁵ Then they told what had happened on the road, and how he had been made known to them in the breaking of the bread.

Reflection - The road to Emmaus-Sr Elisa

We need to understand the story in context. The resurrection stories are told in different ways in different Gospels because the writers are highlighting different aspects of Jesus' identity, life and purpose. They have some things in common, like the empty tomb, the angel [although in some places there are two rather than one and John doesn't have an angel at all). They all include women as the first witnesses, but the women vary a bit. In John's Gospel it's Mary Magdalene and in Luke, it is Mary Magdalene, Joanna, & Mary the mother of James. The disciples who witnessed the empty tomb were Peter and the other disciple in John and in Luke it's Peter on his own.

The consistent thing is that the tomb was empty despite being guarded by soldiers of Jesus' opponents, the women were the first witnesses and then at least Peter, also witnessed the empty tomb, and later Jesus appeared to his followers and according to Paul many others.

In Luke's Gospel the women do not meet the risen Christ at the tomb, they met angels who told them to tell the disciples.

As we come to the experience of the resurrection by the two disciples on the road to Emmaus, it is still Easter Day, and no-one has yet seen the risen Lord. The woman and Peter have seen the empty tomb, the angel has told the women that Jesus is alive and will meet with them in Jerusalem. Unlike Matthew who has the story focused in Galilee, Luke has the whole story coming from Jerusalem, and the Good News going from there to the whole world. Thus, the scene is set, and now we can begin to think about what is happening in the story today.

Pause

Two disciples going home with broken hearts; Jesus, the one they had put so much hope in was dead. The two knew the story of the women's visit to the tomb that morning and they also knew it had been verified by others, but still they did not believe that Jesus was alive. They were both sad and confused.

They had clearly known Jesus in some way in life, although they were not among the central membership group as described in the Gospel, and yet as they speak one would believe they were

deeply connected to the inner group of disciples. Still they did not believe, or maybe it was just too much to take in and believe.

It's interesting what happens when one has been through a deeply traumatic experience. People tend to go back to what is familiar and safe- they need normal, but normal is no longer normal and in that safe space of familiarity a process begins. The process always changes our lives in some way forever. A person dies, something new in us emerges to fill the space of a relationship which was important.

This corona virus, when the restrictions are lifted, we will all on some level strive to regain the lives we had but our understanding of life and the world is already challenged to the core and we will change. Whether for the better or worse is yet to be seen. What are some of the things we are realising in this new world?

Well, we share our world with the people of China, and the things which threaten them can also be a threat to us. The world is not so big.

Again, we can communicate and be in relationships, without being physically connected. Our health, science and medical people are essential to the wellbeing of our world, and what they find and discover has bearings everywhere.

Truthfully, our awareness of the reality that the world is one, is so much more entrenched than it has ever been.

The folk on the road to Emmaus are in this process of change, their grief is palpable, for some of us, there is a similar grief for the lives we've had and the people and things we've lost, which is probably how it would have been for folk during and after the wars too. The road to Emmaus is like reaching out to lives which have been lost.

The thing which is good, is that these two disciples are together and discussing what happened, and in that space, full of lost hope and disappointment, full of confusion, Jesus comes alongside of them and listens to them. Unrecognised, he invites them to share the story, and then he begins to teach them, what they already knew in their heads. As Jewish people of their day, who had been with Jesus on the various journeys and missions, they would have known their Scripture, so they knew this stuff, but they'd not put it together and taken it to heart.

Hearing Jesus as the stranger on the road speak to them, their hearts were burning as the events of the passion were brought into the perspective of the Jewish Scriptures, prophecy, and expectations. Their hopes and dreams began to revive as things started to make some sense.

Finally they arrived home, invited Jesus for a meal and then during the meal, they watched him take and break and bless the bread and then distribute it, just as he'd done with the loaves and fishes, just as he'd done at the last supper.

This is my body, broken for you. Do this in remembrance

This is my blood shed for you. Do this in remembrance And they recognised him, and suddenly they knew they had to go back to Jerusalem They had a life to live with him and for him and it was never going to be what it was. Yes, there would be suffering as Jesus suffered, but overriding all of that was the love and the joy of life promised in both the now and the future.

As they returned to Jerusalem and joined with the other disciples to share their story, they heard that Peter had met Jesus also, and there was hope and expectation and more.

Part of the meaning of this story of the resurrection is that even when life seems at its very worst and we are suffering the consequences of peoples hate and despair, or the consequences of disease or of suffering and death, when there seems to be so much we are powerless over, we are reminded that we need to be together, to share our stories, to seek God's plan in the things which happen, and to discern what God is calling us to because of it, and then finding the new life we are offered through the experience. In doing this, at some point we find Jesus is with us on the journey. Part of the meaning of this story of the resurrection is that when life seems to be so out of our control, God is still present and in control. God's promises are always being worked out in our world, and we can entrust our lives to God, through Jesus Christ our risen Saviour.

Last week we heard that Jesus is with us in our locked rooms, this week the story is that Jesus is with us in our community as we endeavour to make sense of all that is happening in our world. He is walking on this journey with us, listening to our stories, listening to our pain and our searching hearts, and in the end, he is revealed in the breaking of the bread. Because of his resurrection, we are reminded that the breaking of his life and its being given for us, is the place where we can know him and place our love and trust. **Amen.**

Silence for reflection.

We say the Apostles Creed. I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth. I believe in Jesus Christ, God's only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried; he descended to the dead. On the third day he rose again; he ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of the Father; from there he will come to judge the living and the dead.

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen.

We especially pray for those who are seriously ill with Covid 19 and for their family and friends. The prayer concludes with ...in songs of never ending praise: Blessing and honour and glory and power are yours for ever and ever. Amen. As our Saviour Christ has taught us, we are confident to pray:

Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name, your kingdom come, your will be done on earth as in heaven. Give us today our daily bread. Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us. Save us from the time of trial and deliver us from evil. For the kingdom, the power and the glory are yours now and forever. Amen.

When we 'hallow' the person selling *The Big Issue* our mind is tuned (imperceptibly) further to the dial of holiness. Holiness grows in us as we act according to God's holy law of Love. Of course, we move towards a godly life. Richard Foster's book, *A Celebration of Discipline,* gives instruction on the 12 classic ways. It is well worth setting out to discover yourself using these disciplines. Mind you, the more you do, the more there is. The Christian search for Holiness is like munching into the *Magic Pudding,* it doesn't diminish or run out no matter how much you eat. What delights are in store for those who search after holiness and give as much as they take.

Instead, as he who called you is holy, be holy yourselves in all your conduct; for it is written, "You shall be holy, for I am holy." 1 Peter 1: 15-16

Members in Madagascar regard their sisters suffering with fistulas as holy in God's eyes. They embrace those who are outcast and give them skills to regain their self-confidence. Holy bodies and holy minds fed with Holy Scripture begin to trust God again and trust themselves. Thanks be to God, hallowed be His name.
