THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

FIRST READING Acts 7.55-60

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

⁵⁵ But filled with the Holy Spirit, he gazed into heaven and saw the glory of God and Jesus standing at the right hand of God. ⁵⁶ "Look," he said, "I see the heavens opened and the Son of Man standing at the right hand of God!" ⁵⁷ But they covered their ears, and with a loud shout all rushed together against him. ⁵⁸ Then they dragged him out of the city and began to stone him; and the witnesses laid their coats at the feet of a young man named Saul. ⁵⁹ While they were stoning Stephen, he prayed, "Lord Jesus, receive my spirit." ⁶⁰ Then he knelt down and cried out in a loud voice, "Lord, do not hold this sin against them." When he had said this, he died.

A reading from the first letter of Peter

¹¹ Beloved, I urge you as aliens and exiles to abstain from the desires of the flesh that wage war against the soul. ¹² Conduct yourselves honorably among the Gentiles, so that, though they malign you as evildoers, they may see your honorable deeds and glorify God when he comes to judge.

¹³ For the Lord's sake accept the authority of every human institution, whether of the emperor as supreme, ¹⁴ or of governors, as sent by him to punish those who do wrong and to praise those who do right. ¹⁵ For it is God's will that by doing right you should silence the ignorance of the foolish. ¹⁶ As servants of God, live as free people, yet do not use your freedom as a pretext for evil. ¹⁷ Honour everyone. Love the family of believers. Fear God. Honour the emperor.

¹⁸ Slaves, accept the authority of your masters with all deference, not only those who are kind and gentle but also those who are harsh. ¹⁹ For it is a credit to you if, being aware of God, you endure pain while suffering unjustly. ²⁰ If you endure when you are beaten for doing wrong, what credit is that? But if you endure when you do right and suffer for it, you have God's approval. ²¹ For to this you have been called, because Christ also suffered for you, leaving you an example, so that you should follow in his steps.

²² "He committed no sin, and no deceit was found in his mouth." ²³ When he was abused, he did not return abuse; when he suffered, he did not threaten; but he entrusted himself to the one who judges justly. ²⁴ He himself bore our sins in his body on the cross, so that, free from sins, we might live for righteousness; by his wounds you have been healed. ²⁵ For you were going astray like sheep, but now you have returned to the shepherd and guardian of your souls.

How can we know the way?" ⁶ Jesus said to him, "I am the way, and the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me. ⁷ If you know me, you will know my Father also. From now on you do know him and have seen him."

⁸ Philip said to him, "Lord, show us the Father, and we will be satisfied." ⁹ Jesus said to him, "Have I been with you all this time, Philip, and you still do not know me? Whoever has seen me has seen the Father. How can you say, 'Show us the Father'? ¹⁰ Do you not believe that I am in the Father and the Father is in me? The words that I say to you I do not

speak on my own; but the Father who dwells in me does his works. ¹¹ Believe me that I am in the Father and the Father is in me; but if you do not, then believe me because of the works themselves. ¹² Very truly, I tell you, the one who believes in me will also do the works that I do and, in fact, will do greater works than these, because I am going to the Father. ¹³ I will do whatever you ask in my name, so that the Father may be glorified in the Son. ¹⁴ If in my name you ask me for anything, I will do it.

For the Gospel of the Lord

Praise to you Lord Jesus Christ

Reflection - Sr Elisa

After my ordination, a family friend who had known me most of my life, turned to me and said that she thought I was just like my father who was also a priest. To be honest I was really taken aback. My dad was an intelligent, strong and principled man and whilst I have a lot of that, it comes out in my life in a way which is very different to him. So, I replied: 'I don't think I'm anything like dad, why do you think that?'

She said something which I wasn't even aware of, but I can see. She said, 'You have his joy and his faith.' Now that's true. If I'm honest, I can see bits and pieces of both of my parents in myself. I come from them, and have lived with them in my formative years, and been near them throughout my life, so it's not surprising.

Have you ever had people say things like that to you?

In the Gospel today, Jesus is saying that he is in the Father and the Father is in him. Well there is truth that some of that reality comes

from his very nature. His Father is the one behind his incarnate [human] life and his life was lived as closely to his Father as any life. But of course, there is more. The risen transcended Christ who is the pre-existent 'Word of God', exists eternally without beginning or end in unity with the Father and so Jesus can say to his disciples,

'don't you know me? Whoever has seen me has seen the Father. Believe me that I am in the Father and the Father is in me, but if you do not, believe me because of the works themselves, very truly I tell you the one who believes me will also do the works that I do....'

This speech is given by Jesus as part of the last supper discourse and in it he is preparing his disciples for his ultimate physical departure, first through his death and then after his resurrection through his Ascension.

As we listen to it unfold, there are three things which I would like to highlight.

- 1. The use of the word 'believe'.
- 2. The idea of dwelling in the Father's house.
- 3. And the idea of Jesus being the way the truth, and the life.

At the end of the Gospel, John wrote a clear purpose statement.

"Jesus performed many other signs in the presence of the disciples, which are not written in this book; but these have been written so that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God; and that believing you may have life in His name." (John 20:30-31)

So, for John, the purpose of his book is for the reader to believe and the fruit of belief is *life in His Name*.

The Greek word 'believe or believing' used by John, is mostly a verb, something which is active and not static in any way. It is not just a simple agreement to doctrines of belief. It is a complete, living, and active response to knowing God, through Jesus his Son.

Therefore, the characteristics of belief in Jesus in John's Gospel is expressed in ways such as,

faith in his word, abiding in him, trusting him, loving and obeying him, and faith and worship fixed on him.

So, to believe in Jesus, is to live a life in total trust and surrender to God through Jesus his Son. This is where the peace of God emerges and where our troubled hearts find their rest. If we trust God, we can let go of our fears and concerns.

The idea of having a dwelling place with the Father is the next bit I want to look at.

Jesus promises that he must leave in order to prepare a place for us in his Father's house. The translation and so understanding of this is a bit tricky, but the outcome of it is stunning.

In other parts of the Gospel Jesus speaks of abiding in him and he in us. In this passage, the Greek word used for abiding which is a verb is turned into a noun. So, it becomes an abode. So, when Jesus speaks of a place in the Father's house it means that we are with

the Father. Through abiding, or having a relationship with Jesus, we live with the Father.

Thus, Jesus is our way, our truth, and our life. When we abide with him through believing, that is having a faith which reflects his life in us, then he is the way to the Father for us.

In this regard I just want to speak a little about the Letter from Peter, which shows one way of Jesus being the way, the truth and the life.

In the past, the letter has been used to support slavery and to make slaves accept the injustices of slavery using the example of Jesus' passivity in his sufferings, when he died on the cross. We know that can't be what God wants, because we understand that all of us were created in the image of God, and Jesus died for all of us, so we could be free. Jesus came into the world not just for sinners but for the poor and the oppressed. His death on the cross was not an acceptance of injustice, but God's way of overcoming it.

John particularly makes it clear, that Jesus actively laid down his life for the world- there was nothing passive about it. In this Covid 19 world, we are laying down some of our freedoms, to ensure the ultimate wellbeing and freedom of all people, there is a surrender in it, but it is not passive.

The thing to note in the way Jesus died, is that he did not further the injustice of his enemies. He chose it for a purpose; to heal and reconcile the world to himself. He accepted the cruelty and punishment of his enemies, but he did not compromise the truth of God's love for all of humanity, despite their hatred and injustice. So, in Jesus there is love and grace and forgiveness. The Christian way does not allow hatred and violence to be perpetuated. Jesus' way is to challenge it with love so that human sin does not overcome. That means to work for justice, healing and reconciliation as Jesus did.

As followers of Jesus, we must welcome and include all people, but we must also stand in the faith of Christ and be prepared to lay down our lives for the wellbeing of the world.

Sacrifice and martyrdom come in many ways. For example, the church speaks of white martyrdom and red martyrdom. Red martyrdom is when a person dies for their faith. St Stephen was a red martyr who was stoned to death for witnessing to the truth of the Gospel.

White martyrdom is the martyrdom which witnesses to God's love in lives given over to God. All Christians in this sense are called to be white martyrs. The word martyr, by the way means witness. It means to reveal God's love and truth with our lives.

That is the way. The way of Jesus is standing in the truth of God's uncompromising love despite hatred, despair and destruction. And the life then flows from this. It is a life which knows the fullness of what it is to be free in the love of God. To find its completeness and integrity without an after-taste of yuk or guilt. It is a life filled with God's Spirit which reflects the love and joy of God even in the face

of suffering. And it is a life which extends beyond itself into the whole of creation and even beyond death itself.

This passage is often used in funerals as a comfort to mourners who recognise that their loved one is with God. There is truth in that. But it is also for the living to know that in Jesus we are with the Father. In Jesus we have a life which is filled with God's grace, joy and freedom and all we need to do is to choose that life by saying continually, yes to Jesus, the word of God made flesh, and alive, in us through his Holy Spirit. Amen.

Silence for reflection.

We say the Apostles Creed. And

I believe in God, the Father almighty,
creator of heaven and earth.

I believe in Jesus Christ,
God's only Son, our Lord,
who was conceived by the Holy Spirit,
born of the Virgin Mary,
suffered under Pontius Pilate,
was crucified, died, and was buried;
he descended to the dead.
On the third day he rose again;
he ascended into heaven,
and is seated at the right hand of the Father;
from there he will come to judge the living and the dead.

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen.
