THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

FIRST READING Acts 17.22-31

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

²²Then Paul stood in front of the Areopagus and said, "Athenians, I see how extremely religious you are in every way. ²³ For as I went through the city and looked carefully at the objects of your worship, I found among them an altar with the inscription, 'To an unknown god.' What therefore you worship as unknown, this I proclaim to you. ²⁴ The God who made the world and everything in it, he who is Lord of heaven and earth, does not live in shrines made by human hands, ²⁵ nor is he served by human hands, as though he needed anything, since he himself gives to all mortals life and breath and all things. ²⁶ From one ancestor he made all nations to inhabit the whole earth, and he allotted the times of their existence and the boundaries of the places where they would live, ²⁷ so that they would search for God and perhaps grope for him and find him—though indeed he is not far from each one of us. ²⁸ For 'In him we live and move and have our being'; as even some of your own poets have said,

'For we too are his offspring.'

²⁹ Since we are God's offspring, we ought not to think that the deity is like gold, or silver, or stone, an image formed by the art and imagination of mortals. ³⁰ While God has overlooked the times of human ignorance, now he commands all people everywhere to repent, ³¹ because he has fixed a day on which he will have the world judged in righteousness by a man whom he has appointed, and of this he has given assurance to all by raising him from the dead."

10 For "Those who desire life and desire to see good days, let them keep their tongues from evil and their lips from speaking deceit; 11 let them turn away from evil and do good; let them seek peace and pursue it.

12 For the eyes of the Lord are on the righteous, and his ears are open to their prayer.

But the face of the Lord is against those who do evil."

13 Now who will harm you if you are eager to do what is good? 14 But even if you do suffer for doing what is right, you are blessed. Do not fear what they fear, and do not be intimidated, 15 but in your hearts sanctify Christ as Lord. Always be ready to make your defence to anyone who demands from you an accounting for the hope that is in you; 16 yet do it with gentleness and reverence. Keep your conscience clear, so that, when you are maligned, those who abuse you for your good conduct in Christ may be put to shame. 17 For it is better to suffer for doing good, if suffering should be God's will, than to suffer for doing evil. 18 For Christ also suffered for sins once for all, the righteous for the unrighteous, in order to bring you to God. He was put to death in the flesh, but made alive in the spirit, 19 in which also he went and made a proclamation to the spirits in prison, 20 who in former times did not obey, when God waited patiently in the days of Noah, during the building of the ark, in which a few, that is, eight persons, were saved through water. 21 And baptism, which this prefigured, now saves you—not as a removal of dirt from the body, but as an appeal to God for a good conscience, through the resurrection of Jesus Christ, 22 who has gone into heaven and is at the right hand of God, with angels, authorities, and powers made subject to him.

Praise to you Lord Jesus Christ

Reflection - Sr Elisa Sermon. The Spirit of Truth.

In today's Gospel reading we have the commandment to love, twice; and in between we have a whole ream of material on the Spirit of Truth and the Advocate!

At issue is the commandment to love and because the commandment is at both ends of the reading, we can take it that

the teaching in between is about how we can meet such a difficult command.

Before I get into it, I want to address something which could be inferred from the passage. That God's love is conditional on our love in response. We need to be clear, that is *not* true. We were all loved from the very beginning, it is why we were made, and why God journeys with us and why he sent Jesus to enable us to have a saving relationship with God. As Nicky Gumble always says and repeats often; 'God loves you.' That is true for everyone, Christian or not.

The passage, however, is addressed to the Christian community. Our experience of God's love is different to people who are not in relationship with God through Jesus Christ. We know this wonderful love of God and have accepted it as part of our lives, so we want to respond in like. Jesus is telling us that the way we respond is by obeying the commandments.

Despite all the brokenness, frailty, and sin, which gets in the way Jesus, through his life, death and resurrection has provided us with a way of entering this relationship with God. Because he cannot be with us physically, he is saying that the Advocate or Spirit of Truth fills us in his place and enables us to respond to God's love. Jesus is very clear the required response is for us to obey the commandments, summarised as.

'Love the Lord your God with all your heart and mind and being and your neighbour as yourself.'

The first thing we need to know about Christian love is that it is not about feelings. You can dislike someone and still love them. That is

because Christian love means to care for the good, or the wellbeing of the object of love.

The truth is we find this incredibly difficult. We have difficulty loving ourselves, and we have difficulty loving our neighbours and so have difficulty loving God.

As we grow in the faith and reach out to meet the demands of these commandments, we first of all realise we cannot do it in our own strength and secondly, there is much in us and in the world which pushes us away from obeying them. We need help. We need help with just our everyday relationships because our feelings get in the way. We are afraid of rejection or being misunderstood or not getting what we think we might need.

To help with this Jesus speaks of *another* Advocate sent by his Father. Jesus is our first Advocate and when he ascended to heaven, the second Advocate is the 'Spirit of Truth'.

The Greek word translated 'advocate' is 'paraclete' and can also be translated as 'helper' or 'comforter'.

The idea is that the paraclete is one who stands with us and supports us in our endeavours to obey these commandments.

This gift of the 'Spirit of Truth' is with us when we live in relationship with Jesus who is 'the way and the truth and the life' as we heard last week.

John makes the point that the world [that is; those people who are not in relationship with Jesus] cannot receive, see or know him. That doesn't mean they will never have a relationship with him, but that they have not yet responded to the call for such a relationship.

So, what is the Spirit of Truth? It lies somewhere in the person of Jesus. And why do we use the word Truth as a title and descriptive? Because all truth rests in God and one of the most significant ways the Spirit of Truth supports us is by helping us to see the Truth of God in Jesus, the Word of God in flesh.

In this modern world truth is something we struggle with. It becomes a further block for our ability to obey the commandments. People often seem to be manipulating the truth for dishonest reasons or for personal gain. They tell half- truths or exaggerated truths to achieve their ends. One of the refreshing things about the state of emergency over Covid19 is that our governments are not manipulating us as much, but are working together for our wellbeing, and it is so obvious, and people are feeling more secure because of it.

We all understand that we can have different views about things and see them from different angles- thus the idea of relative truth, but so often relative truths are presented as absolute and we know they are not. We live in a world where the truth or truth in general is constantly being muddied.

I believe that being able to be honest in relationships even when honesty is difficult can enrich and build trust and hope and thus is an expression of love. The best marriages are the ones where people can have a fight and then work it through by being both honest and open with each other and find ways to give and take as a consequence and so move forward in love.

Intimate relationships are gifts which help teach us to love one another and as we do so, we shape each other and grow as God's

people. That happens in marriages, in families and in church communities and where-ever we engage with other people.

Most of us carry deep hurts and wounds in our lives which have come to us through damaging relationships and things which happen. These wounds affect our sense of being lovable and we meet them when we try to get close to others and find that patterns of behaviour developed to help us survive, get in the way. It's easy to avoid these things by not getting into relationships which can stir them up, but there are times when we hit them, and experience an irrational show of anger or fear. These are invitations for us to look at the truth of what is behind those wounds and bring them to the light for healing. Love in this sense takes deep courage to face our own brokenness and fear and allow it to come to the light and be healed.

I had a friend who was affected deeply by what seems to have been an evil belief system of her parents which led to her having some very deep emotional wounds. When any conversation mentioned beliefs, which were different to her own, she would rant about it for a considerable time and could not be stopped or moved in her view. Most of us learnt to avoid the subject, but these things came up from time to time and it was damaging her relationships. Then one day she realised what she was doing, and she sought help, and now that situation does not affect her in the same way because there has been a deep healing. The truth will set you free! The Spirit of Truth was leading her to all truth.

This is also true in our relationship with the world. Much of our behaviour towards each other and the earth is based on our own needs, which are not real needs but neediness due to our brokenness, and so we do not always consider the consequences of our actions. Even when we know the consequences, we fail to love God, each other and our world.

Sometimes, through God's grace, we are given responsibilities, through family or work. We are entrusted with the life of a community of people and we are called to love and act in interests beyond ourselves and to reach out and teach, share and be the love of Christ. As we do this, we meet our blocks, and are forced to grow through them, and so we learn and deepen under the guidance of the Spirit of Truth which leads us into all truth. Which leads us to the truth which passes all understanding.

At the end of the day, what we begin to realise about the Spirit of Truth, is that it is not just about facts and figures to be proven empirically, but at a deeper level it is about relationships and love. As we enter into this relationship with God, through Jesus, the Spirit of Truth units us in the truth; it enriches us, those around us, and the world; as we move toward our ultimate goal, union with God and the fulfillment of the Kingdom. **Amen.**

When we can text a message to India and talk to a cousin in the Antarctic in *real* time, having to actually wait for a conversation or an answer to a party invitation seems like agony – and unnecessary. If we are disturbed, agitated by waiting, we can set up strategies; the very first is to be thankful for *time*, *waiting time*, *God's time*. Travelling home from work past houses after house, consider that God made and loves whoever lives behind those walls. Is this the season for my branch (me!) to do something?

I wait for the Lord, my soul waits, and in his word I hope; my soul waits for the Lord more than those who watch for the morning, more than those who watch for the morning. Psalm 130: 5-6

Waiting to grow up and take one's place in the adult world can be very fraught for some. Members in Wales are God-inspired as they use a strategy of teaching young homeless people new skills like cooking. We thank God for this loving and timely action which is building their self-esteem and confidence to enter the season of living independently.

PLANT SALE

Gardening tips for our November Plant Sale -

Cut back flowered perennials- geraniums etc, lemon verbena bush, herbs. Take cuttings and place in sandy light soil, place pot into plastic bread bag, tie at top and stand in sheltered place. Store dahlia tubers, lift gladiola corms, and plant spring bulbs in pots so you can bring them inside when flowering. Dead head agapanthus - keep seeds to sow in spring. Continue to lift self -seeded bush/tree seedlings and pot up.
