#### FIRST READING Genesis 45.1-15

A reading from the book of Genesis

Then Joseph could no longer control himself before all those who stood by him, and he cried out, "Send everyone away from me." So no one stayed with him when Joseph made himself known to his brothers. <sup>2</sup> And he wept so loudly that the Egyptians heard it, and the household of Pharaoh heard it. <sup>3</sup> Joseph said to his brothers, "I am Joseph. Is my father still alive?" But his brothers could not answer him, so dismayed were they at his presence.

Hurry and bring my father down here." 14 Then he fell upon his brother Benjamin's neck and wept, while Benjamin wept upon his neck. 15 And he kissed all his brothers and wept upon them; and after that his brothers talked with him.

### **SECOND READING Romans 11.13-32**

A reading from the letter of Paul to the Romans

<sup>13</sup> Now I am speaking to you Gentiles. Inasmuch then as I am an apostle to the Gentiles, I glorify my ministry <sup>14</sup> in order to make my own people jealous, and thus save some of them. <sup>15</sup> For if their rejection is the reconciliation of the world, what will their acceptance be but life from the dead! <sup>16</sup> If the part of the dough offered as first fruits is holy, then the whole batch is holy; and if the root is holy, then the branches also are holy.

<sup>17</sup> But if some of the branches were broken off, and you, a wild olive shoot, were grafted in their place to share the rich root of the olive tree, <sup>18</sup> do not boast over the branches. If you do boast, remember that it is not you that support the root, but the root that supports you. <sup>19</sup> You will say, "Branches were broken off so that I might be grafted in." <sup>20</sup> That is true. They were broken off because of their unbelief, but you stand only through faith. So do not become proud, but stand in awe. <sup>21</sup> For if God did not spare the natural branches, perhaps he will not spare you. <sup>22</sup> Note then the kindness and the severity of God: severity toward those who have fallen, but God's kindness toward you, provided you continue in his kindness; otherwise you also will be cut off. <sup>23</sup> And even

those of Israel, if they do not persist in unbelief, will be grafted in, for God has the power to graft them in again. <sup>24</sup> For if you have been cut from what is by nature a wild olive tree and grafted, contrary to nature, into a cultivated olive tree, how much more will these natural branches be grafted back into their own olive tree.

<sup>25</sup> So that you may not claim to be wiser than you are, brothers and sisters, I want you to understand this mystery: a hardening has come upon part of Israel, until the full number of the Gentiles has come in. <sup>26</sup> And so all Israel will be saved; as it is written,

"Out of Zion will come the Deliverer; he will banish ungodliness from Jacob." <sup>27</sup> "And this is my covenant with them, when I take away their sins."

<sup>28</sup> As regards the gospel they are enemies of God for your sake; but as regards election they are beloved, for the sake of their ancestors; <sup>29</sup> for the gifts and the calling of God are irrevocable. <sup>30</sup> Just as you were once disobedient to God but have now received mercy because of their disobedience, <sup>31</sup> so they have now been disobedient in order that, by the mercy shown to you, they too may now receive mercy. <sup>32</sup> For God has imprisoned all in disobedience so that he may be merciful to all.

## Reflection - Sr Elisa

# The Canaanite woman.

World view!

How we see and experience our world is shaped by many things.

Our God given character and life experience shape us, but there are other things which impact on us as well.

The culture and family into which we are born.

I grew up in a Christian home, and whilst I had the option to turn my back on Christianity, my parents' worldview from a Christian perspective has impacted me and all my siblings regardless of our faith.

For example, most of my family are religious in some ways, if not Christian. We all love Christmas and Easter, and we love our family and our family gatherings. We are all imbibed with a value which seeks reconciliation when there has been conflict and, on that level, we don't shut the door on each other, not forever anyway. I have noticed that in some families, they do.

I have also been impacted by our wider and more individualistic culture. I like to do things my way. I like to have stuff even if I don't really need it and I am addicted to the internet and the media. I can critique it, but it is all deeply embedded in my way of functioning and most of it is taken for granted on many levels.

If I have failed to give a full description of how my worldview functions, it's because it is so embedded in me, that I mostly cannot see it. That is cultural blindness and we all have it.

A common cultural blindness in wealthy western cultures is the inequities between us and the third world and the way our culture manages its wealth so that it keeps the poorer countries poor. For example wages: Most of our manufacturing has gone to third world countries because our basic standard of living demands a higher wage, and owners feel they cannot afford to pay at that rate, or they don't get the profits they desire. So, we have become conditioned to buy cheaper goods from third world countries where workers barely receive a living wage. Most of the time we don't even think about it. That is cultural blindness!

Shifting people from deeply embedded prejudices which are formed in a closed world view can be extremely hard as we have experienced in many areas of life. Black lives matter movement is one, the loud fence movement is another, the lack of investment in aged care is another which our current pandemic is making clear. The way oil and petrol are used and abused in our environment is also surfacing as another which is emerging in the rising issues with waste management. There is so much isn't there, it feels overwhelming?

Judaism in Jesus' day was very closed in. The Jews were ruled by Rome and by Jewish Law [the Torah which was the Law of God given to Moses on Mount Sinai]. As far as Jewish Law was concerned its application depended a bit on which school of the Law you belonged to. The Pharisees had a lot of sub laws which gave them a sense of deeper purity & the Sadducees were very literal in their interpretation. Thus, you can see that in some ways it was not that different to Christian denominations.

One thing all the Jewish sects seemed to agree on was their exclusion of non-Jews as corrupt because of their not keeping or knowing the Law. Thus, was the saying "Gentile dogs". Which was derogatory and exclusionary.

This was the cultural world of both Jesus and Matthew the Gospel writer. In fact it is believed that one of the issues for the church of Matthew in the first century, was that his Community was a Jewish Community, possibly even viewed as a Jewish sect or denomination, but they were in conflict because Gentiles were beginning to join them, and the church members were struggling to accept it, and the Jews outside were judging the church harshly as well.

So, we have this little story of Jesus which shocks us in many ways because Jesus is not the lovely Jesus we expect to hear and see.

Jesus has been in controversy with the Pharisees in Gennesaret, which we saw at the beginning of today's Gospel, where he'd challenged the way they twisted the Law so they could actually go against it. He spoke about what comes out of a person's mouth which defiles them, not what goes in. One could say that in the story of the Canaanite woman he went against this teaching.

Gennesaret is in the North western shore of the sea of Galilee. Jesus obviously has had enough controversy and so is withdrawing

towards the region of Tyre and Sidon which is by the Mediterranean Sea north west of Galilee and is Gentile territory. Some-where along this journey, this nameless Canaanite woman, who is desperate for her daughter, came to Jesus and began to plead for his help, his mercy.

The inclusive and welcoming Jesus of the crowds in Israel, is not obviously present, but one who is rejecting and closed. Firstly, he simply ignored her and didn't even acknowledge her until the disciples, who were irritated with her, told Jesus to send her away.

Secondly, he told her he had come for the lost sheep of Israel, echoing the directions he had given the disciples when he had sent them out on mission.

And then he called her a 'dog', some say it could be translated as a puppy which takes out some of the sting, but it was still rude and rejecting.

"It is not fair to take the children's food and throw it to the dogs."

For most people, that level of rejection would be enough for them to give up, but this woman was not prepared to settle on being a victim, her daughter whom she loved, and whose healing she sought was too important to her.

For the woman's part her behaviour was loud [she shouted at him], pushy and persistent like a great itch that will not go away. But she was also respectful and understood who Jesus was.

"Have mercy on me, Lord, Son of David"

This echoes the voice of the blind man on the road to Jerusalem. 'Son of David' is a Messianic title.

She carried on until she forced the group to give her their attention.

When Jesus was not welcoming but talking about his coming for lost sheep of Israel.

But she came and knelt before him, saying,

"Lord, help me."

This is a posture of both humility and prayer.

<sup>26</sup> He answered, "It is not fair to take the children's food and throw it to the dogs." <sup>27</sup> She said, "Yes, Lord, yet even the dogs eat the crumbs that fall from their masters' table."

Even as she kneels before him, she will not take no for an answer. She knows that the table of God is enough for everyone and she reminds Jesus of this.

When Jesus answered her, he sounds shocked,

"Woman, great is your faith! Let it be done for you as you wish." And her daughter was healed instantly.

That phrase, 'Great is your faith', reminds us of the story of Peter walking on the water and nearly drowning,

'O you of little faith'.

In Matthew 8:5 there is a story of another Gentile who came to Jesus for help, Roman Centurion who went to Jesus and sought the healing of his servant. He was also commended for his faith.

So, we see examples of little faith and great faith and those with the great faith seem to be the 'Gentile dogs', who came to Jesus for help. They accepted their position with him as a Jew; neither expected him to go to their homes, but both have their faith commended and their petitions answered.

In the story Jesus is shocked out of his cultural worldview to see that the grace of God is just as much for the Gentile woman as it is for the Jews, and so he moves from rejection to compassion and inclusion.

This is a story which would have challenged its hearers to move in their view also. Jesus' action invites people when they see that there is another side to the story, to change their position. The Jewish Christians to include the Gentile believers as part of the church. That is a big shift in world view.

In terms of the woman's behaviour, her faith was not just persistent, it was insistent on inclusion and justice. It was a faith that refused to be treated as a victim. It was a faith that in the end scored the right response from Jesus.

I think of people whose voices have been shut by our cultural attitudes and blindness, many of whom have suffered, people like Adam Goodes who is a brave voice for indigenous people in this country and there are many others.

This is why we need to be a people who listen deeply and are attentive to the voices we hear crying out for our mercy, and we too must pray for God's mercy, to help us be the people we are called to be.

We are being called to change our minds where God's grace is demanded by those we'd prefer not to notice or hear, and begin to find it in our heart to repent, that is turn around and see the truth of what is before us. A person, a land, a people who need to know our love, mercy, and compassion. What can we do to change our attitudes and thus open our world- view?

Listen and learn what they are seeking. Allowing our world view to be reshaped by their lives and experience. And so, revealing to them, the hope of the Kingdom for their lives, by being people of justice and grace. Amen.

Silence for reflection.

Let us together affirm the faith of the church.

We believe in one God, the Father, the almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, light from light, true God from true God, begotten not made, of one being with the Father; through him all things were made.

For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven, was incarnate of the Holy Spirit and the virgin Mary and became truly human.

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried.

On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father.

He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is worshipped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church.

We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins.

We look for the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come. Amen.
