Dear people of St Paul's,

Over the next 5 weeks we will be keeping the Season of Creation. This is a time when we give thanks for our wonderful world given to us by God to enjoy and to care for. We are this year thinking about a year of 'Jubilee'.

Jubilee is a custom kept by ancient Israel where every 50 years things were restored to their natural place. Slaves were set free, debts forgiven, land taken from families, returned, and the land itself rested in order to regenerate.

So in this season we are reminded to think about how we might forgive each other, how we might rest our land from damage and pollution and how we might participate in God's work of restoring our world to God's intended beauty, joy and provision.

In this time of Covid19 we have much to ponder. The land is in many ways being rested because of our forced Sabbath to ensure our protection from a terrible disease. We have seen how some environments began to be cleaned almost instantaneously. We have no idea why a pandemic starts, but it is helped along considerably by our cultures of overcrowding, over and under employment, and lack of care for our world, and thus ourselves and each other.

This is an opportunity to ponder and pray about these things.

THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

FIRST READING Exodus 12.1-14

A reading from the book of Exodus

The LORD said to Moses and Aaron in the land of Egypt: ²This month shall mark for you the beginning of months; it shall be the first month of the year for you. ³ Tell the whole congregation of Israel that on the tenth of this month they are to take a lamb for each family, a lamb for each household. ⁴ If a household is too small for a whole lamb, it shall join its closest neighbour in obtaining one; the lamb shall be divided in proportion to the number of people who eat of it. 5 Your lamb shall be without blemish, a year-old male; you may take it from the sheep or from the goats. ⁶ You shall keep it until the fourteenth day of this month; then the whole assembled congregation of Israel shall slaughter it at twilight. ⁷ They shall take some of the blood and put it on the two doorposts and the lintel of the houses in which they eat it. 8 They shall eat the lamb that same night; they shall eat it roasted over the fire with unleavened bread and bitter herbs. ⁹ Do not eat any of it raw or boiled in water, but roasted over the fire, with its head, legs, and inner organs. 10 You shall let none of it remain until the morning; anything that remains until the morning you shall burn. 11 This is how you shall eat it: your loins girded, your sandals on your feet, and your staff in your hand; and you shall eat it hurriedly. It is the passover of the LORD. 12 For I will pass through the land of Egypt that night, and I will strike down every firstborn in the land of Egypt, both human beings and animals; on all the gods of Egypt I will execute judgments: I am the LORD. 13 The blood shall

be a sign for you on the houses where you live: when I see the blood, I will pass over you, and no plague shall destroy you when I strike the land of Egypt.

¹⁴ This day shall be a day of remembrance for you. You shall celebrate it as a festival to the LORD; throughout your generations you shall observe it as a perpetual ordinance.

commit adultery; You shall not murder; You shall not steal; You shall not covet"; and any other commandment, are summed up in this word, "Love your neighbour as yourself." ¹⁰ Love does no wrong to a neighbour; therefore, love is the fulfilling of the law.

¹¹ Besides this, you know what time it is, how it is now the moment for you to wake from sleep. For salvation is nearer to us now than when we became believers; ¹² the night is far gone, the day is near. Let us then lay aside the works of darkness and put on the armour of light; ¹³ let us live honourably as in the day, not in revelling and drunkenness, not in debauchery and licentiousness, not in quarrelling and jealousy. ¹⁴ Instead, put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the flesh, to gratify its desires.

Reflection - Sr Elisa

Week 1 Season of Creation.

This year's 'Season of Creation' is about coming to grips with our place in God's world. Over the next 5 weeks, on one level, we are looking at the big picture of the God given world we enjoy, as well as bringing it back to us and to how we as Christian disciples, bring God's kingdom into this world by playing our part towards bringing the human world into alignment with God's will and purpose for it.

The organisers of the Season for this year, have declared it a year of Jubilee. Jubilee is a calendar event in the Jewish faith which occurs once every 50 years. Leviticus 25:8–13 states:

You shall count off seven Sabbaths of years, seven times seven years; ...forty-nine years. Then you shall sound the loud trumpet on the tenth day of the seventh month. On the Day of Atonement, you shall sound the trumpet throughout all your land. You shall make the fiftieth year holy and proclaim liberty throughout the land to all its inhabitants. It shall be a jubilee to you; and each of you shall return to his own property, and each of you shall return to his family. In that fiftieth year ... you shall not sow, neither reap that which grows of itself, nor gather

from the undressed vines. For it is a jubilee; it shall be holy to you.

So, Jubilee involves Sabbath rest for people and for the land, it involves forgiveness of sin and of debt, and the restoration of people and land to their right place. It is a time when slaves are freed, and people return home. It is a time when people and land are renewed and given a new start.

As we look at our world this day, we are experiencing an enforced kind of Sabbath due to Covid19 and many suffer because of it. People are suffering because they are isolated, they are not experiencing the levels of stimulation and escape that they have been programmed to expect, not enough work, entertainment, and consumerism, which they depend on to avoid aspects of life, and they are not able to feed their addiction to social interaction, so many are deeply lost and afraid.

What is needed is a kind of balance. A balance God intends for us, between enjoying having our basic needs in life met, with work, rest, the protections and joys of life, and relationships.

Within our culture, this kind of balance is extremely counter cultural because over a long time, we have been increasingly caught up with a capitalist program which is dependent on growing consumerism and a growing differentiation between the poor and the rich.

I remember when I was growing up, the shops & most businesses closed on Saturday lunchtime and wouldn't open until Monday mornings, so families had time to relax together and do things together. Then opening hours were increased, so people had more time to shop and gradually recreation time was whittled away, and people have become used to instant gratification. People had less time to ponder in their gardens or walk in the bush instead, in their time out they went shopping or something similar.

In those days, full time work was 38-40 hours a week mostly 9-5, now for many people, they work flexi hours, which is helpful for families, although sometimes it means working 70 hours a week and some people work shifts of 3-5hours at a time, 4 or 5 days a week, for the convenience of their employers. So, there is both over employment and underemployment. Some; when they left school went on to university and got a degree and many went into trades or retail or had other less academic training which led them directly to a career and work. Now most young people are expected to study until they are in their 20's and often it is difficult to find work when they begin to look for it.

These creeping changes have in many ways made us a wealthier culture and many live very good lives because of it. There are also many who struggle to keep up. They are the ones who are unemployed, homeless, and who are depressed. Some of the toxic side effects of the way we live.

There are other toxic side effects too. The poisoning of our waterways, the pollution of our air and land, the creeping deserts, the dying reefs, and the changes to our climate.

So, this month we are seeking to hear what God is saying to us in all of this and how we might respond. By looking at the set texts in the lectionary, we will also discover that our God is entirely consistent in his call for us to live a more balanced life. So today.

The reading from Exodus about the first Passover. On one level it is an awful story, where God is destroying all the first born of Egypt- human and animal alike and as he does this, he saves his chosen people. This Old Testament view of God, sees God as a God at war with other deities, expressed through his love and protection of a particular people. In the Prophets this version of God shifts substantially to a God who seeks conversion and peace and justice for <u>all</u> people. And of course, Jesus' life and teaching is consistent with this understanding of God.

One point which has been universally carried forward though, is the battle against false Gods. You see it throughout the whole of Scripture, when Adam and Eve were driven from the garden of Eden after they tried to have the power of God in the knowledge of good and evil.

You see it in the constant Old Testament stories where the Jewish peoples strive to purify themselves and cleanse the land and the temple from idols and idolatry. Finally in the person of Jesus, the sacrificial lamb of God, God rescues us from the battle by overcoming the death caused by sin and evil and forgiving us our failings. At the same time he calls us to be stewards of this earth; for the sake of the coming Kingdom and the renewal of the whole of creation.

Part of the Good News is that on one level Jesus has done this for us and on another level, we do not have to do it on our own, we do it as community. And we do it in peace and love, knowing at the deepest possible level that Christ has already reconciled us and healed our world. That does not mean that we have no responsibility for it, it means that we have the freedom to live into that world.

In the letter to the Romans, Paul makes the point, that we are to be subject to the rule of human government. Again, that doesn't mean compromising our faith. Where our faith is undermined, we are to follow the rule of Christ, but we do not set about creating conflict, we live quietly obedient lives filled with grace and love. The command to love one another and the essential law of obedience to God is key in this.

So a response to a call to growing consumerism which is counter to God's purposes for the earth, might be to grow a vegetable garden, or even in a more missional way a community garden, which connects people and the earth together.

Matthew is building his church. It is a church coping with internal conflicts due to the introduction of Gentiles into a largely Jewish Community. The Gospel has two parts, one is the parable of the lost sheep, making the point that every life is totally precious to God.

The second part is a teaching about how members of the church should reconcile with each other when they are caught up in disagreements or when one person has wronged another.

The process described is clear cut, in a way that is idealistic. So, following these directions to the letter may not always be that simple. But there are a few things in this which are important. One is that we should work directly with the issue and not avoid it. The temptation to gossip is a sign of avoidance. So, we need to do the emotional hard yards rather than extend the conflict into the community. Only when we fail in our attempts at peace making do we seek the assistance of others to help bring reconciliation. If a person ends up being sent from the community it is a deeply sad thing and not done lightly.

This teaching is surrounded by stories which emphasise how important every individual is to God in the parable of the lost sheep. Earlier there were stories which emphasized the importance of humility and forgiveness also. In the Kingdom of heaven, we are to be like little children. Sometimes deep reconciliation requires a lot of personal effort to understand

our own motives, and to then to listen to the other person so you can understand them. Often it takes time and patience and deep trust.

As we think about these things around the season of creation, it is clear that at the core, we need to be reconciled with God through entrusting our lives in God alone and then we need to be reconciled with our world, each other and creation.

We need each other in this, so the Christian community and its wellbeing is important, we need to love each other both here where we can see and appreciate each other, and we also need to be loving our human brothers and sisters across the globe, and our children and grandchildren into the future, by reflecting on our choices and how they will affect our world both today and tomorrow.

What can we do individually and as a community to ensure justice for the world and humanity?

Love God,

Love each other,

Live simply and carefully with the resources we have.

Be involved in campaigns for third world and environmental justice.

And pray for wise discernment to enable a deep cultural change which aims at the wellbeing of all, rather than just ourselves or the wealthy and clever few. **Amen.**

Silence for reflection.

Let us together affirm our faith.

We believe that God creates all things, renews all things, and celebrates all things.

We believe earth is a sanctuary, a sacred planet revealing God's love and providing us with a home to share with all of Creation.

We believe that God became flesh and blood, became a piece of Earth, a human being called Jesus Christ, who lived and breathed and spoke among us, suffered and died on a cross for all human beings and for all creation.

We believe that the risen Jesus is the Christ at the core of creation, reconciling all things to God, renewing creation, and filling the cosmos.

We believe the Holy Spirit renews life in Creation, groans in empathy with a suffering creation and waits with us for the rebirth of creation.

We believe that with Christ we will rise and with Christ we will celebrate a new Creation.

PRAYERS OF INTERCESSION

In our prayers today we are going use our imaginations to try and link the detailed needs of our own church with the great purposes of God for the whole of creation.

Pause

Imagine you are standing outside of St Paul's, looking at its familiar shape, and thinking about all it represents- the worshipping community who gather week by week, the daily prayer which no-one sees, the spiritual energy which inspires people for their ongoing lives, the groups which belong to it, its good works. All the rough edges of the wonderful band of Christians which make up our church.

Pause

Now try and see our church as God sees it and loves it. In silence pray for the life of the church, mentioning any special concern you have for our church life now...

Long Pause.

God who renews Creation

Hear our prayer.

Now rise above the church and see the whole of East Ballarat and Ballarat. Look on the whole of it and be aware of its vibrancy; all the myriad activities, shopping, worshipping, washing cars, arguing, maybe even crying. Plans being made over breakfast tables. Children totally absorbed in their games. Some watching TV. People sitting anxiously at bedsides or alone. Some who we know are unwell. Doctors and nurses at work. This is our place with its homes, streets, parks, schools and places of work. Also, with its stories, myths, history, and dreams.

Pause

Now let us look down on our parish area and see it as God sees it, and cares for it, for everyone without exception. In silence let us pray for this place, in whole or in part, holding it in the warmth of God's good will and purpose...

Long Pause

God who renews Creation

Hear our prayer.

And now let us rise higher still, and see in the eye of our imagination, this whole country, with its vitality and beauty and its cities. From Melbourne and Sydney CBD's, to Sunshine and Parramatta, from Adelaide to Elizabeth, Perth, Fremantle, and Brisbane. Darwin. Our rural towns and places: Alice Springs, the Flinders Ranges. Katherine, the Kimberly and the Pilbara, Gold Coast. The towns of the early gold rush. Its beautiful rainforests and growing deserts.

We see a nation rich in talent, loving its sport, addicted to TV, largely content to live without God. We know there are people who struggle to live well because of poverty; our institutions are creaking, it is hard to be a good politician and materialism is our major faith.

Pause

Look down on this land and try to see it as God sees it. Not with favoured nation status, except that every nation is at the centre of God's loving attention. See this land bathed in the love and grace of God...

Longer pause

God who renews Creation

Hear our prayer.

And now let us rise very high, and see our whole world, as if seeing it from space. A small colourful ball, blue and brown and smudged with cloud. The earth, our home. So insignificant, and yet so densely packed with life and purpose. A world of infinite riches and complexity and needing careful looking after. A world suffering a serious pandemic, and which has been threatened by wars. A world which has had its finely balanced eco systems interfered with recklessly. A world which has made extraordinary progress and yet has been immeasurably cruel. A world which has chosen to go its own way, ignoring the Maker's instructions.

Pause.

Try and see this bruised planet as God sees it, precious in grand design and in minute detail. See it and pray for it. The Kingdom of God is a healed creation....

Longer pause.

God so loved the world...that he gave his only Son.

Amen. Amen.
