For the Gospel of the Lord Praise to you Lord Jesus Christ

Sermon – Sr Elisa

Today's Gospel story is one of the most theologically rich stories in the Gospels. It tells us a lot about who Jesus is and what he will accomplish. The story reflects the early church's understanding that the fulfillment of the promises made to King David which we heard in the Old Testament is completed in the person of Jesus. That promise was that God would build a house for David, meaning a dynasty which will last forever. This is the origin of the Jewish Messianic expectation.

The line of David, in terms of Israel's Kings, came to an abrupt halt at the time of the Exile, which is why there was a mystery around 'The Messiah' which means 'the anointed one'. Every king was anointed, but when there was no Davidic King the idea of 'The Messiah' was a promise longed for and to be fulfilled. One of the things we can take from all of this is the sense that trusting in God's promises is not a guarantee that we will see all our hopes fulfilled in this life but may take generations to reach fruition. This is what happened with the Jewish expectation of a Messiah.

What I want to focus on today though, captures something of this, but also touches us in other ways. We live in a world and a culture which likes to think we are in control of what happens and that we can and should control things. One thing about that is that when things are not in our control but still impact us, we often feel traumatised. We are the same way when we can't understand life and the things which happen in life.

Both are gifts because, feeling out of control, and not understanding lead to wonder and curiosity, which drives the scientific endeavour, and also, when accepted leads us to the wonder and contemplation of the mystery of life. Therefore both lack of control and understanding can help us grow in our relationship with God.

I wonder how you go with not understanding things which happen to you in your life? Most of us struggle with it in some ways. Some responses I am aware of from both within myself but also listening to and observing others are:

- Blaming parents: 'I'm like this because mum or dad always...'
- Creating stories about life to answer the questions about ourselves our woundedness and other things that we can

understand. This is the role of myth- and we all do it- it often sounds like truth but is a truth which creatively fills the knowledge gaps.

- Fear in the face of powerlessness and being without control.
- Such powerlessness can lead to a few different but connected manifestations.
 - Humility: which is an acceptance of one's place in the reality of the Creation.
 - Loss of confidence or self-esteem: which comes from the false belief one ought to have understanding.
 - Anger: which comes from the false belief that one has a right to know what is impossible to know.

There are many things over which we have little control, for example; life and death. It is hard to stop bush fires when we've had long droughts and things are dry and then we have storms with lightning. We can control the space around properties so there isn't a lot of fuel for the fire near a home, but it is hard to stop a fire. It is the same with a disease like Covid19. We either take refuge until we are rescued by a vaccine or we succumb to the consequences of the disease, which means sickness and death and loss of industry.

We know that people are currently speaking of the third wave of Corona Virus. They are saying it will be the mental fall out of the disease. People have been confronted by their lack of personal power and knowledge.

In our society these are big issues because most of the time we feel we have the knowledge and control of our lives that we need, but then we are forced to recognise that we don't. So, this story of the annunciation I think is important for us in our world today.

Some might want to view the story as an interaction between Mary, a young girl, and an Angel, the spokesperson of God, as a meeting of unequals and so reflects an injustice. And if it were a purely human interaction that would be entirely true, because where there is inequality of power and pressure applied on the weaker person, that equates in many ways to abuse, especially if it is to the benefit of the person of power and not to the other.

But we are speaking of God here. God is always more powerful than we are so there is always an inequality in our relationship with God. God is one who does have all knowledge and all control and knows and understands us and our needs. God is also a God who is all love, whose motive is not about himself but about fulfilling promises for the wellbeing and restoration of Creation.

When we look at the annunciation story, we can see that there are some powerful things in Mary's reaction to the angel that suggests that she is not totally powerless. First, the angel tells her not to be afraid, but there is no evidence that she is afraid. We are told in the story that she was 'confused and wondering' according to the Common English Bible translation or in the NRSV she was 'perplexed'. Neither particularly mean afraid. So, one thing this tells us is that even if she was young, she was strong in her character and this is supported by her other recorded responses.

When told she was to conceive a child, she wondered: "How can this be, since I am a virgin?"

A perfectly appropriate question given the situation.

The angel's response to her question is not really an answer we'd find easy, and the proof given which is Elizabeth's pregnancy is interesting too.

35 The angel said to her, "The Holy Spirit will come upon you, and the power of the Most- High will overshadow you; therefore, the child to be born will be holy; he will be called Son of God.

36 And now, your relative Elizabeth in her old age has also conceived a son; and this is the sixth month for her who was said to be barren.

37 For nothing will be impossible with God."

And then we hear Mary's ultimate and life response.

"Here am I, the servant of the Lord; let it be with me according to your word."

This response is what makes Mary a true hero of the faith. Firstly, she gives herself over to God by acknowledging the truth of her relationship to God, and then submits to God's call on her life.

Her only point of control in all of this is her response. She recognises that God is working out God's purposes in her life and in faith she surrenders to it. It would not have been in any way expected as it came, even though it fulfills all the prophecies. Mary, through her engagement to Joseph, was of the house of David, so what happened was entirely consistent with Jewish expectations on one level, but it's not Jerusalem, it's not in a place of power, it's basically happening with ordinary peasant people.

She would have faced a lot of negative judgement about her unexplained pregnancy. There was a deep risk of her even being put to death because of it, but she still co-operated, and later rejoiced with Elizabeth at the wonder of God's work through her. The Magnificat which we will sing later in the service reveals her understanding of how God is working through her.

So, what can we learn from this:

First of all, there is a big plan and a big picture of which we are simply a small but significant part. Regardless of us, God's purposes are being worked out in our lives and we can choose or not to accept those purposes.

This does not mean we need to be unthinking or to allow ourselves to be walked over, what it means is using our minds to discern between the limits of our relationship to God and what we do with our lives. This is not necessarily an easy task and much of it is tied into our vocation, our calling. If you are a scientist, you may be called to question and interrogate reality more so than a shop keeper or a parent for example.

In the end in faith though, every one of us is called to reflect Mary's response in our lives. For some of us, the journey to that place may be more difficult than for others, because it is a journey which teaches us that we are not the centre of the world. Yes, we are deeply loved, but so is everyone. Yes, we are a part of God's creation, but God is THE Creator.

We have been given power over God's Creation to care for and nurture it, but the way we use our power is, in so many ways not ours but God's and does little but damage and corrupt the world. One could say that the fall happened because we chose to try to take power from God and the whole of Creation has suffered the consequences of it.

So then how do we respond.

We focus our hearts and minds on God. We pray, we discern God's will and purpose. We choose to not only seek it, but to say yes to it. And when we do this, like Mary, the life of Christ begins to grow and gestate within us and he is made present through us in our world and the healing of the world happens.

This is the deepest and most profound truth about the incarnation, and part of our call is to be witnessing to its reality in these days when climate change, Covid, bushfires, conflicts between nations, and religion,s and cancer, and dementia, and so much else seems to rage through our world.

Instead of feeling hopeless and powerless, we can to say to God in the midst of it all; "I am your servant, let it be to me according to your word'. And then we need to live out the grace of God through Jesus Christ as our lives unfold. We then become channels of faith, of hope, of love, and of salvation.

We cannot do any of this without hope. Our hope is not in ourselves, that's where things are hopeless. Our hope is through being part of a community that believes and trusts that God is in control and is working out a plan for our redemption through our lives, today. That's what makes Mary such a wonderful model of faith.

Very few of us are gifted as she was, for most of us we need to grow into a faith like hers, and growth more than anything simply takes time and patience. I pray that this year as we reflect on the nativity, we can each have a sense of God's faithfulness to us, despite the madness of our world, and so entrust ourselves to his call upon our lives to enable his truth to grow in all of us and so through us into our world. Amen.
